

Shahzad Siddiqui is a Toronto-based lawyer and Chief Legal Officer at Broadwater Consulting Inc, an Islamic finance firm based in Toronto, Canada. A graduate of the University of Toronto and Osgoode Hall Law School, he worked at one of Canada's oldest and largest law firms, Fraser Milner Casgrain LLP, before teaching the law of international business transactions at Southwest University of Political Science and Law in Chongqing, China, the most populated city in the world. He subsequently spearheaded the entry of a Chinese conglomerate into the Islamic Republic of Pakistan.

He previously worked as an investment banker and consultant for Ittihad Securities, a Toronto-based Islamic private equity firm. He has acted as legal adviser to UM Financial, Canada's premier Islamic mortgage firm, and as business development adviser to Islamic wealth management teams at HSBC Securities and Macquarie Private Wealth, formerly Blackmont Capital, a top-tier Canadian investment bank. His eclectic client base also includes First Global Data Corp., a Shari'a-compliant money remittance firm, the Chinese Muslim Association of Canada and the Islamic Foundation of Toronto Inc., one of Canada's largest mosque and school facilities.

He co-presented with Guy David of Gowlings LLP, a former counsel at the Bank of Canada and author of the first Canadian report on Islamic housing finance, at the inaugural seminar on Islamic finance by the Canadian and Ontario Bar Associations and with Mufti Talha Ahmad Azami of BMB Islamic at the Ninth Harvard Forum on Islamic Finance, on the topic of 'Abrahamic' mutual funds. In addition, he acted as master of ceremonies with Michael McMillen at the inaugural finance IQ Islamic finance conference in Manhattan in October 2008 and, more recently, at the UFANA Conference 2010 in Toronto, in his capacity as Executive Director of the first dedicated Islamic finance association in North America.

He is the co-author of several current and forthcoming Euromoney publications including Fruits of the Orchard: endowments for Mosques and Islamic charitable organizations in Western and Muslims Lands and Cross-Border Regulation of Islamic Finance and Foreign Investments in North America.
